

DIY Composting Toilets Ideas

Note; Check with your county for restrictions regarding composting toilets and human waste disposal. Feces from humans or animals that eat meat (ie. dogs and cats) should never be used as garden compost.

We created a DIY Wood Chip Toilet for our cabin, after doing a lot of research. It seems the simplest users friendly option to avoid harsh chemicals, and believe it or not it doesn't smell! The key is to have a nice base of shavings in the bottom, and to cover each use with a fresh handful of pine shavings (\$5 at the ranch supply stores). We lined our bucket with a compostable trash can liners and dumped them in a refuse pit that we layer with other organic materials to assist with the breakdown of materials ... it is good to get it all watered down before covering the pit.

Another quick DIY outhouse or Cabana idea. Dig a regulation pit and surround it with 3 small straw bales. Mount a standard toilet seat to a sturdy plank that will balance on the two side bales over the pit. Again line the pit with pine shavings and use compostable TP and a handful of pine shavings after each use. Use 1 of the straw bales to top off the pit, water it down before covering the pit with fill dirt. We did this at a wilderness retreat, put a bamboo screen around it and a patio umbrella for an awesome little cabana in the woods. There are pop-up like outhouses that can be purchased for more privacy.
